

SCHOOL-YEAR YOUTH LEADERSHIP

Our Network and Student Coordinators help design, launch, and lead our school-year programming, from our social media presence, to the Power Up Conference, to our alumni programming and special projects. They are college students with experience and interest in leadership, global issues, communications and/or program management.

FELLOWS

Global Youth

Fellows are program alumni who lead special projects and events. Recent highlights:

Elections Fellows Avia, Fairooz, and Srilekha spent the year after their program leading our efforts to educate and activate youth around voting. They produced 36 videos highlighting the power of the youth vote, which were shared on Instagram, Tiktok and Youtube. The Fellows also published three op-eds sharing their personal reflections on the importance of voting, one of which was published in the IndyStar. In addition, the Fellows hosted a Facebook Live with distinguished political experts, including Anthony Mitchell, Legislative Assistant and CEO of Engage with Impact, Arriyanna Patton, a law student at Thurgood Marshall School of Law, Andrew Webber, a political research strategist and founder of Black Jubilee, and Kadida Kenner, the Director of Campaigns at the Pennsylvania Budget and Policy Center.

COVID-19 Fellows Tova and Mohamed continued our efforts to amplify the impacts of COVID-19 on youth throughout the '20-'21 school year. They produced 19 videos highlighting the youth perspective on COVID-19, and hosted two livestreams with prominent experts highlighting the intersections of COVID-19, public health, and mental health. Their livestreams featured Satvik Sethi, a mental health activist and social entrepreneur, and Dr. Joshua Sharfstein, Vice Dean For Public Health Practice and Community Engagement at Johns Hopkins University. The fellows also published op-eds highlighting their perspective on COVID-19 and called on leaders in their communities to take into account youth voices in their decision making. Tova's pieces was published in the Chicago Sun Times and led to a longer investigative feature on COVID's impact on youth.

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GLOBAL SCHOLAR: EMPOWERING YOUTH LEADERS

Global Scholar is a global leadership accelerator program that prepares youth to be visionary leaders and bold changemakers around urgent global challenges. Now in our 14th year, Global Scholar remains the cornerstone of our work amplifying the voice and power of global youth. The program rests on three key pillars:



Activating our Global Citizenship



Exploring our Greatest Global Challenges



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Building Bold Leaders & Visionary Changemakers

During this period Global Scholar participants hailed from 20 US states and 14 countries, including Morocco, France, Ukraine, Syria, South Africa, South Korea, Pakistan, Yemen, Peru, India, Egypt, Canada, and beyond. Global Scholar doesn't just teach you how to change the world-it teaches you how to change yourself, to then change the world even more.



Global Scholar Intensive Washington, D.C. or Online

Our flagship program, the Global Scholar Intensive session equips youth leaders with the expanded knowledge, community, and confidence to launch a lifetime of changemaking.

Based in Washington, D.C. or online, Scholars meet experts from around the world, participate in our transformative Action Lab workshops, and design projects to launch back at home.

This and all of our programs place a strong focus on youth leadership on global issues, featuring youth speakers and experts from around the world.



Global Scholar Gender Justice 4 Day Short Course

Designed as a deep dive into the specific challenges facing women and LGBTQIA+ communities, this 4-day workshop explores framing concepts like human rights, feminism, and gender justice, as well as the specific challenges of workplace justice, reproductive rights, and access to education. We cap it all off with our signature Action Lab workshops and projects applying new skills for real-world impact.









GLOBAL SCHOLAR: CUSTOM & SHORT COURSES

Global Scholar: Power Pack Series 1-3 Days Online

Our Power Pack workshop series connects youth around the urgency and tension of this post-COVID moment, inspiring them to think about what the future of education, the workplace, and our communities can look like; build hard skills for launching a big idea; and connect with others inspired to step up and forward to re-envision and design our world. The Power Pack workshops are 1-2 day virtual experiences, connecting youth from around the world.





Global Scholar: NYC

Our Global Scholar: OppNet program is a customized learning experience for Opportunity Network Fellows in New York City. Based on our three program pillars -- global citizenship, exploring global issues, building bold & visionary global leaders -- the program takes a special look at local challenges, change makers, and decision makers, equipping high school youth from across New York City with a deeper sense of confidence to be leaders in their communities. The OppNet sessions have ranged from 2 - 4 weeks in length, delivered both in person and online.


It was an unforgettable once-ina-lifetime experience that I wouldn't have been able to receive anywhere else- more than anything I could've ever imagined going into the program.



Global Scholar: Arts & Social Change 5 Day Short Course

Designed for artists and non-artists alike, this 5-day workshop helps participants connect with the visionary, visceral, emotional, and sometimes unspoken side of our work as youth leaders. Held online in 2021, in 2022 participants were on the ground and met with artists, visionaries, and creatives across New York City.





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Global Scholar: COVID-19 5 Days Online (NYC, Morocco & USA)

COVID-19 disrupted life as we know it, but also opened space for us to articulate a new vision for our communities, education, workplaces, and more. In 2020 we offered three COVID-19 specific versions of the program. One session was designed for youth in NYC, and two sessions were designed with an intercultural focus for a blended class of youth from the US and Morocco. All three featured public health experts from Johns Hopkins, the CDC, and beyond, who provided deep insights into the challenge, and helped us further conversations around what youth can do to address it.

Global Scholar: Cross- Cultural 5 Days Online (Morocco & USA)

In 2020, we brought together 50 youth from the US and Morocco for two special Global Scholar sessions focused on building intercultural understanding in the context of COVID-19. Funded by the Stevens Initiative, Scholars not only deepened their understanding of the issues and confidence as leaders, but they built lasting ties with youth from around the world. I'm inspired to continue learning about what I'm passionate about because I can make a difference and I'm capable of being the leader I want to be and do great things.



POWER UP CONFERENCE: CONNECTING YOUTH VOICES

The Power Up is AMP Global Youth's annual student-designed event, bringing young leaders from around the globe together to explore, refresh and connect. Designed and led entirely by our Fellows and Student Coordinators, the Power Up has brought tremendous speakers from around the world face-to-face with youth leaders eager to re-energize their changemaking.



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LOCKING AHEAD: SCALING AND INNOVATING TO ADDRESS THIS MOMENT



Our programs have a proven and transformational impact on youth, and our goal is to ensure they are as accessible as possible for any student who wants to join us. Here's where we're headed in 2023 and beyond.

Launching Our Virtual Programs with Discovery Education

We are building a virtual curriculum to launch on the Discovery Education platform, which would reach millions of youth in the US and beyond with youth-led and engaging content around climate change, girls education, democracy protection, and much more. This is a game-changing expansion for us, and one in urgent need of financial support.

Expansion of Travel-based and Intercultural Education

We are eager to continue expanding our place-based programs, both in the US and around the world. In 2023 we're launching new partnerships to bring Global Scholars to the Legacy Museum in Montgomery, Alabama, and eventually to the Tanzania, in partnership with our partners at YouLead Africa. These and all of our programs are in urgent need of scholarship funding, to ensure that every student who wants to join us is able to do so regardless of ability to pay.

Support for State of Global Youth Report

This flagship product will articulate the needs, values, and priorities of youth in the US and around the world, as shared through conversations, interviews, and artistic pieces. We can drastically expand the scope of the report, and the dissemination of its findings, with additional financial support.

Sponsorship of the Global Youth Visionary Awards

We need to celebrate youth leaders, and make sure their story and advice are widely shared with the next generation. Our goal is to expand the scope and number of Global Youth Visionaries each year, expanding the program from a one-time reward to a "changemaker-in-residence:", who can have a more hands-on and meaningful relationship with the Global Scholars.

Scholarships for Global Scholar

Our flagship program has a transformational impact on youth. We are totally self-funded off of program revenues, and dedicate almost \$50,000 to scholarships every year. Yet too many students are still unable to attend due to lack of financial resources. We are eager to bring this experience to any and every student who wants to join us.
